Transforming the VMFA Gardens To Be In Concert with Nature

Lead Horticulturist Michael Partusch and Horticulturist Jaimie Woll are working hard to transform the E. Claiborne and Lora Robins Sculpture Garden with a focus on Sustainable Growing and Pollinator Partnerships. Both Michael and Jaimie are former employees of Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens. They currently have eight amazing Council volunteers working with them.

Michael's goal is to achieve a balance of pollinator friendly plants with natives along with more cultivated varieties. He has been transforming the VMFA landscape properly and thoughtfully with no shortcuts.

The first project was the pollinator garden between the Robinson House and the Belvedere where there are 30 varieties of plants ranging from Echinacea, Rudbeckia and Gaillardia to Lemon Thyme, Dianthus and Lobelia. Michael's plantings are designed to attract birds, bees and butterflies throughout the seasons. According to Michael, we should not fight nature but rather create sustainable, organic gardens that are in concert with nature.



Michael believes that there is a connection between fine arts and horticulture. His fine arts background has helped him to focus on color, texture and shape when designing to create successful landscapes. He also believes that hand watering is preferable to irrigation systems to target plants specific water needs, lessen the spread of disease and to identify pests early before they become a real problem. This method of care and attention to detail is one of many reasons why volunteer help is so important to the success of the entire Sculpture Garden.

In his spare time Michael is also a musician. He plays the piano and the guitar to relax from his horticultural duties. - Gail Gilmore and Diane Barbour -

Ask Me Ambassadors (AMAs) are "front-of-the-house greeters" who perform a very special service for VMFA. They greet visitors, both local and from around the world, as they arrive and provide safe storage for coats, backpacks, umbrellas, and other valuables while VMFA guests explore the museum. They also provide wheelchairs, electric scooters, baby strollers, and folding gallery seats when requested.

Gallery Maps and information about special exhibitions can also be found at the Coat Check Desk. AMAs also answer questions and provide suggestions to increase the Visitor Experience.

AMAs perform approximately 18 hours of service per quarter. Typically two volunteers are scheduled per 2.5 hour shift. Since the museum is open 365 days a year, weekends and holidays are also covered by AMA volunteers. However, scheduling is "volunteer friendly" and flexible.
